# Reger Festival Highlights for September Scott Lillard

The **Bay Area Max Reger Festival** will include five concerts on consecutive Sundays at **St. Mary's Cathedral** in San Francisco, beginning **on September 14**. Two additional concerts will be held at the First Presbyterian Church of Oakland and Trinity Episcopal Church in Reno.

The inaugural concert on Sept. 14 will be given by **David Hatt** and will contain the two experimental chorale preludes of the middle period, <u>Come</u>, <u>Sweet</u> <u>Death</u> and <u>O Traurigkeit</u>, <u>O Herzeleid</u>, works which are remarkable for their density. The latter work was probably composed for a two-pedalboard organ, which may be difficult to visualize, but just think of short, stubby pedal keys placed above the normal pedalboard. In that work, the melody in long notes is played by the right foot on the short keys, while the left foot plays a bouncy bass part.

The highlight of the on Sept. 14 concert will be the <u>Introduction, Passacaglia and Fugue</u>, Op. 127, which was composed in 1913 for the dedication of a huge organ by Sauer in Breslau. The architecture of the piece attempts to match the grand scale of the organ, and the Passacaglia theme is quite beautiful.

**Isabelle Demers** will present the following two Sunday concerts, **Sept. 21** and **28**, as well as the **Sept. 26** noontime concert at **Trinity Episcopal Church** in **Reno**. She was recently appointed organ scholar at Trinity Wall Street in New York, and she brings a wealth of performing knowledge to her task, which is the complete Chorale Fantasias. On Sept. 21, her program is the Op. 27 <u>Ein feste Burg</u>, Op. 30 <u>Freu dich sehr</u> and Op.40 <u>Wie schön leuchtet</u> and <u>Straf mich nicht</u>. On Sept. 28, she will play the Op. 52 <u>Alle Menschen műssen sterben</u>, Wachet auf, and <u>Hallelujah!</u> <u>Gott zu loben</u> Fantasias. Each of these works is a massive musical statement, full of beauty and complication. A complete list of the October concerts will be published in next month's Newsletter.

### AGO 2008 Annual Meeting Melanie Cervi

For those of us who have attended many Annual Meetings, for those who equate Annual Meeting with nap time, for those who dreaded the time spent away from the Display rooms, Wednesday, June 25, 2008 was not an afternoon to look forward to. For those of us who have only attended local chapter Annual Meetings, curiosity reigned. I was not disappointed!

The meeting was billed as "not a boring, report-laden, 'nuts and bolts' meeting". Prizes and Awards were announced and presented; elected officers and National Council Members were thanked, introduced and Installed. And reports were brief with reference to published versions. So much for the business.

There were also several compositions performed. A Stephen Paulus composition written for the Organ Spectacular Concerts next October was performed. Outgoing President Frederick Swann was feted and thanked, musically of course. And Marilyn Keiser played the delightful Ornament of Grace by Bernard Sanders. After all, what would an Organists meeting be without music centering on the organ?

As I sat listening to the description of the gift given by Marianne Webb to the AGO, I began to put names with faces, connect past Pipings & Mixtures shorts with people of note, and generally feel more connected. All that made Washington DC a likely destination on July 4, 2010 for me and perhaps a friend or two. Ok, I'll admit to getting distracted trying to figure out how to grab a quick dinner and make it to the busses for the taping of Pipeworks, but all-in-all, the Annual Meeting of the American Guild of Organists was an experience to share, not groan about. Besides, now I have ideas for our chapter Annual Meeting!

#### AGO Conventions Kay Lee

The National AGO Convention at Minneapolis/St. Paul was a wonderful convention, featuring great music played by great organists and sung by wonderful choirs. A number of very exciting concerts/recitals happened on Tuesday, June 24, featuring **Cristina García Banegas**, **James Diaz**, **Stephen Cleobury**, **John Weaver**, and **Cameron Carpenter**.

#### Recital by Cristina García Banegas at the St. Paul Seminary in St. Paul -- Noack organ, II/27 (2000).

St. Paul's Seminary Chapel was a beautiful, clean-look chapel with the white casings of the Noack organ in back of the altar. There was an attention-riveting painting on the entrance wall depicting St. Paul, on the ground on the road to Damascus, with Jesus Christ appearing and speaking to him.

**Ms. García Banegas** is a specialist in Latin American music, and a lot of her outstanding program reflected this. It was divided into 3 parts: Old World, New World, and Both Worlds. She played Buxtehude, Georg Kaufmann,

and J.S. Bach for the Old World selections; Zipoli, Joseph Gil Paolmar, Sabatan, and Palazin for the New World selections; a composition by Ms. García Banegas and the Organ Sonata #3 by Hindemith for the Both Worlds selections. I really enjoyed the whole program, but especially liked the Bach transcription "Concerto/Trio in E flat", the joyful Zipoli piece "Introducción de la Princesa de Madrid", and the Paolmar piece "Sonata en Do". This last piece was neat with the use of the chimney flute stop and her toe percussion effects.

Ms. García Banegas was so very gracious in her presentation.

#### Concerto Concert with Stephen Cleobury and James Diaz at Bethel University, Benson Great Hall, in Arden Hills -- Blackington organ, III/67 (2003).

This was a neat concert with the two organists playing alternately with the Festival Orchestra, **Philip Brunelle** conducting. The opener was a dazzling piece "Pebble Beach Sojourn" by Ron Nelson, featuring **James Diaz** at the organ with the brass & percussion sections of the orchestra. The middle two works had **Stephen Cleobury** at the organ with the string section of the orchestra. The last piece again was a dazzler with **James Diaz** at the organ with the full orchestra – "Grand Concerto #3" by Stephen Paulus. (We would be hearing a number of Stephen Paulus pieces at this convention. Mr. Paulus was chosen the 2008 AGO Composer of the Year.) This was a great work, and Mr. Diaz sure showed off his virtuosity!

#### John Weaver/Cameron Carpenter concert at St. Andrew's Lutheran Church, in Mahtomedi --Casavant organ, IV/108 (1927); Schantz (2001).

Oh, boy! Hold onto your seats! **Michael Barone** gave the introduction. He introduced the two organists as "The Esteemed" and "The Steamy". There was laughter in the audience.

John Weaver began the program. His opener was "A Trumpet Minuet" by Alfred Hollins. This was a great piece with a great trumpet sound, good melody, and fanfare. His second piece was Mendelssohn's "Sonata in C minor", which was played so expressively. The Ernest Bloch piece "Suite Modale" followed, with **Marianne Weaver**, flute. A very, very lovely piece. Mr. Weaver ended with a Gian-Carlo Menotti piece and one of his own, "Partita on ''Kingsfold' ". Of course, he got a standing ovation.

After a brief intermission, John Weaver introduced **Cameron Carpenter**. He told us, among other things, how he marveled at Cameron's Mozartian virtuosity.

And then, out on stage came **Cameron Carpenter** – in his white pants, white shirt, and white shoes. He began with Chopin's "Etude", Opus 10, #12. Oh, my!!! Cameron had arranged this, and played all the tremendously fast arpeggios not with his left hand, but with his feet! Unbelievable! Sowerby's "Carillon" followed, and the chime stops used were very nice. Jeanne Demessieux' "Octaves" was next, and was great to watch – his octave technique was fantastic throughout all those mean, angry octave passages.

The next piece delighted all – Bach's "Toccata and Fugue in D minor". Leopold Stokowski would have loved to hear this rendition! Again, Cameron Carpenter arranged this. The orchestration on the organ was astounding. All orchestral sounds were represented. He changed some of the dynamics that one typically hears, just for a really different effect. WOW!!!

The last two numbers on his program were a piece by Joe Hisaishi and one of his own compositions "Nautical Rondo". Yes, he got a standing ovation PLUS. He played "Stars and Stripes Forever" for his encore. You'd have to see it to believe it! He played the piccolo part (even the trills) with his feet! Unbelievable! We left the hall in total amazement.

# Concert for Pipe Organ and Brass T. Paul Rosas

Senior organist, pianist and composer **T. Paul Rosas** invites you to the "**Concert for Pipe Organ and Brass**," Sunday, **Sept. 28**, **3 PM**. at the **Los Altos United Methodist Church**, 655 Magdalena Ave., Los Altos. Tickets are not required; a free-will offering will be taken to help cover costs.

Also performing will be the five-member Valley Brass, which was organized in 2001 as the successor ensemble to the Stanford Brass Quintet. Concerts by the Valley Brass range from serious original works for brass instruments to contemporary popular and jazz arrangements for this uniquely 20th century chamber music ensemble.

The program will begin with J.S. Bach's lively Prelude and Fugue in B Minor. The program also will include major works for brass and organ by American composers whom Mr. Rosas discovered at the 2004 Los Angeles National Convention of the American Guild of Organists. "Triptych" by David Ashley White is a lyrical and wonderfully melodic piece. The program will end with the delightful "Variations on Auld Lang Syne" by the talented Bay Area composer and organist John Karl Hirten. The music for the rest of the recital will be filled with pieces that explore the wonderful colors of the organ.

Another unusual organs, **The Beer Bottle Organ**. There are a number of manufactures that are making organs from beer bottles. As complex a device as it is, the Beer Bottle Organ is actually a very old invention. When Gary Rickert decided to make an organ that used bottles to create notes, he had no idea that someone had tried it 200 years ago. The pastor of the church on the island of Helgoland apparently got tired of paying for an organ tuner to sail out every month, so he commissioned an organ builder to make one that wouldn't go out of tune. Johann Samuel Kühlewein soon created the world's first bottle organ... until 1998. Tha's when Rickert made his version.

The design positions everyday beer bottles so each one is right next to a small air pump. A keyboard up front controls the pumps, and, yeah, the liquid inside really does determine the sound that comes out. But it's not beer — the design uses mineral oil so it doesn't evaporate. The Beer Bottle Organ is really an amazing achievement in instrument design. If you want one, you'll have to get it custom

made, but as conversation pieces go, it's tough to beat. http://dvice.com/archives/2008/06/beer bottle org.php
