MADER ORGAN-PLAYING COMPETITION

Application forms are now available for participation in the **2010 National Organ-playing Competition** sponsored by the Ruth and Clarence Mader Memorial Scholarship Fund. Finalists will compete for prizes of \$6,000, \$4,000, and \$2,000 plus transportation and lodging.

The competition is organized in two phases: a recorded (CD) preliminary competition from which three finalists will be selected, and a final event presented as a concert open to the public. The competition is open to all residents of the United States who will be under the age of 35 on November 6, 2010. Repertoire (30 to 45 minutes playing time) must include one required work: "October Interlude" by Clarence Mader.

Application forms and CD recordings are due by August 1, and finalists will be selected and notified by September 1. The final competition will be held on November 6, 2010, at the Claremont United Church of Christ, Congregational, in

Claremont, California. The organ is a three-manual, 77-rank instrument built in 1998 by Glatter-Götz/Rosales.

The Ruth and Clarence Mader Memorial Scholarship Fund was established in 1971 to honor the memory of two outstanding Southern California artists. Pipe Scaling

Dave Davis asks about the effects of pipe scale on tone (Jan., p.16). Scale, most simply described as diameter in relation to length, is only one of many tonal variables, but is an important one, especially for pipes of the diapason or principle family. I first learned about scaling as a trumpet player. Trumpets come in small, medium, and large bore or diameter. Blown at the same dynamic, the large bore gives a dark tone (more fundamental in relation to upper harmonics), the small bore give a bright tone (less fundamental), and the medium bore, for most work, is "just right." Another way of thinking about scale is to compare the high note of a trombone with a low not of a trumpet at the same pitch. The trombone has a dark tone, the trumpet a bright one. Other examples abound in the orchestra, so the concept of scaling in the organ need not be a mystery.

With an organ pipe, all other factors being equal, a large scale will produce a dark flute-like tone, a small scale will produce a bright string-like tone, and a medium scale will produce a diapason tone. Unfortunately, all things are never equal. The most important variable is the size of the listening room. A beautiful, singing diapason tone poised at exactly the midpoint between string and flute tone in a medium-sized church may sound like a dull flute in a small chapel or a like a bright string in a cathedral church. This is because the pipe must be voiced louder and blown harder in the big room or voiced softer and blown more gently in the small room. In other words, variables other than scale must be taken to extremes in order to achieve an appropriate loudness level. Therefore, making the pipes to the right scale for the acoustic of the listening room is important, because it allows the voicer to achieve an optimum result without going to extremes. The scale, particularly of diapason pipes, needs to close to the ideal for the vocer to have the most freedom to make his diapason slightly dark. Slightly bright, or fight in the middle.

Terms such as "generous" are rather meaningless: generous for one room is skimpy for another. Stop names don't give much of a clue about scaling either. For example, a salicional by some builders is scaled like a string; by others it is scaled like a small diapason. The scaling of organ pipes is a fascinating and complex subject, but the basics are easy to understand and are common with other instruments.
