Dr. James Welch performed on the Schantz organ in the beautiful Mission Church on the Santa Clara University Campus, Santa Clara at **on 17 Feb 2013**.

I know it sounds counterintuitive, but I really enjoy sitting in the Mission at Santa Clara University when it's sunny weather out. It's nice to come in out of the wind and rain too, but the place really is vibrant when the sun is out! That seems to make the acoustics that much better. Dr. Welch did comment that while the organ is modest, it fills the space well. It does in my opinion. So, it's enjoyable when the colors are vibrant, the acoustics shimmering, and the music well chosen!



I commend any of James Welch concerts for the excellence of musicianship, the thoughtful choice of literature, and the informative notes both verbal and written. We were treated to not only 4 centuries of organ works, but a truly wonderful English Horn/Oboe

performer in **Michael Adduci**. I've had the pleasure of working with a student of Michael's. He is not only an inspired teacher, but a meticulous musician. And versatile. Along with the printed program, an arrangement of a movie theme was snuck in. Fabulous. The movie, The Mission, was not recommended, but the melody for Gabriel's Oboe, is a wonderful haunting melody. But I digress. I agree that if you can still play a Bach Trio, you're still up to snuff; and pieces really do sound better in such acoustics. So, in my opinion, the program was enjoyable, the works were carefully chosen, prepared and presented well.

The test for me is always how organists AND nonorganists respond to a program. There were smiles on the students' faces (they learned something and weren't too bored); smiles on the organists' faces (they were inspired and introduced to new pieces); smiles on the non-musicians' faces (they were able to hang their hat on the music and enjoyed themselves) and smiles on the performers' faces (they obviously had fun)! THE LOST CONCERTO

Pièce Symphonique by Richard Purvis

Pièce Symphonique was written by the famous Grace Cathedral organist **Richard Purvis** and first performed on April 25, 1969, with the Oakland Symphony. There was much excitement in the organist community about this new organ concerto and discussion about publishing the new work. Unfortunately, the concerto was not published and the scores were put away and forgotten until recently.

When James Welch (see www.welchorganist.com) began research for a biography of Richard Purvis, he discovered the existence of an unpublished organ concerto. He also found a recording and copies of the original manuscript, which he shared with T. Paul Rosas, who thought that the romantic and engaging work deserved to be seen and heard again. Mr. Rosas offered to engrave the entire piece. Three years later the project has reached completion.

On March 23 the first performance in over 40 years of Richard Purvis's organ concerto will take place at the **First Congregational Church**, 1985 Louis Road Palo Alto with **Master Sinfonia**, conducted by **David Ramadanoff** at 8:00 p.m.

On March 24 the second performance will take place at the at Los Altos United Methodist Church, 655 Magdalena Avenue, Los Altos, 2:30 p.m.

The organist at both performances will be **T. Paul Rosas**.

Tickets are \$20 at the door, \$16 Senior, \$5 Youth under 18.

WELCH PERFORMS WORLD PREMIERE OF ORGAN WORK BY CUPERTINO COMPOSER

On Sunday, March 10, 2013, at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Saratoga concert organist James Welch will present the world premiere of Reflections on the Life of Christ, a suite for organ by Cupertino composer Lothar Bandermann. A sung Evensong service, beginning at 5:00 p.m., will be followed immediately at 5:30 p.m. by the organ concert at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church, 13601 Saratoga Ave., Saratoga. The concert is free and open to the public and will include additional organ works by Bandermann and other composers. A free-will offering will be taken.

A "program piece" in the mode of Olivier Messaien's well-known music for the organ, Bandermann's five-

movement work describes the birth, teaching and miracles, death and resurrection, and ascension of Christ. According to Leroy Kromm, director of music at St. Andrews, the church's large pipe organ and cathedral-like acoustics are particularly suited to the wide tonal colors heard throughout the work.

Lothar Bandermann was born in 1936 into a coal miner's family of seven children near Dortmund, Germany. After high school, he began studying physics. He emigrated to Canada in 1958 and to the United States in 1960, receiving a Ph.D. in astrophysics 1968 from the University of Maryland. He conducted research and taught at the University of Hawaii, where he met his wife, the singer and voice teacher Billie Bandermann. From 1978 to 1998 he was senior research scientist at Lockheed Martin in Palo Alto, designing, among other things, telescopes for the detection of planets around other stars. He retired in 1998 to devote himself to music, his first love. Lothar began piano studies at age 9, first played the organ in church at age 14, and started composing a few years later. Currently parish organist at St. Joseph's Church in Cupertino, he writes music including a highly regarded Requiem for solo, chorus, organ and/or orchestra—primarily for church use and performance.

James Welch is University Organist of Santa Clara University. He also serves as organist of St. Mark's Episcopal Church, Palo Alto. He received the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in organ performance from Stanford University, with further studies in France and Austria. He has concertized internationally, with performances in such prestigious venues as Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris, the Leipzig Gewandhaus, National Cathedral in Washington DC, and the Mormon Tabernacle in Salt Lake City. He has also performed and taught in Beijing, Taipei, Hong Kong, New Zealand, and Jerusalem. A specialist in Latin American organ music, he received a Fulbright award to perform and conduct research in Brazil; since then he has performed in Mexico and edited three volumes of organ music by Mexican composers. The author of a major new biography, Richard Purvis, Organist of Grace, he has performed at conventions of the American Guild of Organists and at the International Congress of Organists. His articles have appeared in The American Organist and The Diapason, and he has released numerous CDs, recorded on a variety of organs in California and elsewhere.

RICHARD PURVIS, ORGANIST OF GRACE A Biography of California's Most Prominent Organist by James Welch

Richard Purvis--organist, choirmaster, and composer at historic Grace Cathedral--became a San Francisco legend and (along with Alexander Schreiner, E. Power Biggs, and Virgil Fox) a national celebrity who made mid-20th century American organ music popular with the masses through records, recitals, and the press. The only book of its kind, James Welch's Richard Purvis, Organist of Grace is a major contribution to our understanding of the music, culture, and church politics of an era marked as much by social change as by a revolution in musical taste, technology, and compositional technique.

Uniquely among his colleagues, Purvis was first and foremost a writer and performer of original music for the organ, thrilling church and concert audiences evervwhere with daring harmony. registration, and evocative emotion of compositions that won him instant acclaim. Hollywood noticed, but Purvis turned down offers to leave Grace to write for the movies. Ed Stout, curator of instruments at the cathedral, famously remarked that Purvis wrote "film music for the Episcopal church." Child prodigy, conservatory virtuoso, prisoner of war--Purvis's life before Grace reads like a movie. Following his epic rise and fall at Grace, he continued to concertize, compose, and teach a new generation of organists in his own image: equally adept at playing church and theatre organs, unafraid to experiment--even with electronic organs--and trained to trust their ears, not just the page.

Through scrupulous research and extensive interviews with those who knew Purvis best, James Welch captures the character, career, and legacy of "The Master of Grace" in a biography that future scholars and readers will return to, again and again, as the Place Where it All Began in Purvis studies.

Richard Purvis, Organist of Grace, 508 pages, is lavishly illustrated with never-before seen photos and a wealth of documents and interviews. It chronicles Purvis's early life in the Bay Area, his years at The Curtis Institute, his military service in World War II, and his tempestuous tenure at Grace Cathedral, where he made the stones sing and crowds cheer. The book includes detailed chapters about Purvis as composer, recitalist, and teacher; complete lists of his published (and unpublished) organ and choral works; the story

of his secret love for the theatre organ; and colorful anecdotes and reminiscences from those who knew him as a friend, teacher, and colleague. His legend continues--clarified, corrected, and completed--in this essential resource for organists, historians, and lovers of music that speaks to the heart.

James Welch's concert schedule for the 100th anniversary year includes three future programs of music that Purvis wrote and performed when he concertized. The first, on May 20, 2013, at 7:30 p.m., will be a lecture/recital for the San Francisco AGO. It will be held at St. Cecilia Catholic Church, 2555 - 17th Avenue, San Francisco, CA 94116. The second, on June 21, 2013, will be played on the small Aeolian-Skinner designed by G. Donald Harrison for St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Salinas, where Purvis joined Virgil Fox and Alexander Schreiner in presenting the instrument's 1954-55 inaugural series. The third, on October 6, 2013, will be performed on the much larger Skinner organ--affectionately called "Gussie" by Purvis and others--at Grace Cathedral. \$\mathcal{I}\$
