JAMES WELCH CONCERT

Anniversary of *The Grapes of Wrath* Celebrated in World Premiere of New Work for Organ

Santa Clara, CA—America's 75th anniversary celebration of John Steinbeck's novel "The Grapes of Wrath" will kick off locally with the world premiere of "Steinbeck Suite for Organ" composed by Franklin D. Ashdown who will be present. This composition for solo organ is specially commissioned for a program of American organ music to be performed by James Welch at 2:00 p.m., February 16, at Mission Santa Clara, Santa Clara University. The concert is part of the University's 2014 Festival of American Music.

Welch's program will also feature organ works by Horatio Parker and Dudley Buck, Richard Purvis and Dale Wood as well as a piano-organ duo with Welch's son **Nicholas**. Welch, who has a doctorate in music from Stanford University, is the author of a biography of Purvis, the legendary organist of San Francisco's Grace Cathedral. Welch recently performed at the University of California, Santa Barbara, and at the Mormon Tabernacle in Salt Lake City. In 2015 he will play at Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris.

A widely published composer of organ and choral music, Ashdown's works have been performed at Grace Cathedral, the Mormon Tabernacle, Notre Dame Cathedral, and St. Paul's Cathedral in London. Leonard Raver, organist of the New York Philharmonic, recorded Ashdown's "Requiem for the Challenger" for trumpe,t and James Welch has included his solo organ music in a series of CD recordings for various labels. Ashdown, a resident of Alamogordo, NM and a retired physician, writes lyrically programmatic music that displays subtle harmony, rich texture, and colorful tonality. Steinbeck Suite comprises a set of five dramatically contrasting movements inspired by famous passages from Steinbeck's fiction.

An avid Steinbeck reader, Welch recommended Ashdown for the commission. "Frank writes for the average audience, like Steinbeck," Welch notes. "From the short opening movement, to his fiery closing toccata, Frank's Steinbeck suite will keep listeners on the edges of their seats. The Mission's reverberant sound, reverent atmosphere, and visual splendor are perfect for Frank's profoundly spiritual sense of acoustical theater."

Steinbeck Suite for Organ was commissioned by the former organist of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Salinas, CA, John Steinbeck's childhood church. Steinbeck himself studied piano, sang in the choir, and was a lifelong fan of opera, jazz, and the music of Bach. His first novel, Cup of Gold, ends with the sound of an organ chord reverberating in the mind of its dying hero.

GEORGETOWN UNIVERSITY ORGAN FEATURED AT SCHOENSTEIN OPEN HOUSE

Benicia, CA – The new three-manual 19-rank organ to be installed at Georgetown University in January was demonstrated for over 100 people at an Open House-Christmas Party in the Schoenstein, Benicia plant. The organ, featuring Schoenstein's double expression system, was fully playable and assembled in the erecting room exactly as it will be in the Dahlgren Chapel at the University. Twelve members of the founding Schoenstein family attended and the highlight of the day was a presentation of a pair of fine oil paintings of the firm's founder, Felix F. Schoenstein, and his wife. The portraits, in matched frames, were painted in 1915 and will become the centerpieces of the new Schoenstein & Co. archive. They were a gift of fourth generation organ builder Bertram Schoenstein. The archive, which has been added to the factory building, is devoted to the history of the Schoenstein firm from its beginnings in Germany in the mid-19th century.

JANUARY CHAPTER EVENT CHARLES CRAMER, ORGANIST AND MASTER PHOTOGRAPHER

The January Chapter Event on **Saturday night, 18 Jan. 2014 at 7:30 PM St. Mark's Episcopal Church,** 1957 Pruneridge Ave, Santa Clara was very successful. There were about 170 in attendance. This event offered a diverse offering featuring the photography of **Charles Cramer**, as well as his music, organists **Darryl Parker** and **Mike Cala**.

Charles Cramer led off the program playing "In Thee is Gladness" by Giovanni Gastolidi, arr. Dale Wood. It's a jaunty little tune, featuring a 4' flute. "I" by Richard Purvis allowed Cramer to show off the deep tremolo on the organ, in a theatre-organ style. "Toccata No 1" by Jon Kristian Fjellestad was composed in 1984 and "Improvisation No. 7" by Camille Saint-Saëns was flawlessly performed. It showed the dynamic and tonal range of the organ which was remodeled by Visscher and Associates in 1989.


Mike Cala then performed "Songs My Mother Taught Me" by Antonin Dvorak, arr. Virgil Fox. Mike then provided the accompaniment to the 1926 silent film "Mighty Like a Moose". Mike was on the staff of the Pizza and Pipes restaurant from 1973 to 1980 and played a mighty Wurlitzer there.

Charles Cramer give an illustrated presentation, "How I became a Photographer and met Ansel Adams." He talked about the many connections between music and photography. Adams started off as a pianist, and Cramer presented some rarely-heard recordings of Adams playing the piano. Cramer became a friend of Adams, attended his workshops and went into the field with him to photograph many of the beautiful things of nature. Cramer also talked about three others photographers who joined him in working with

Adams. Each of these photographers wa also trained musicians. A number of Cramer's photographs were also displayed. Cramer's web page can be accessed at www.charlescramer.com where many of his photographs can be seen.

The final portion of the program featured **Darryl Parker**, who played Joseph W. Clokey's "Ballade in D". Clokey, composer, teacher, and performer, was on the organ faculty of Miami University (Ohio) for many years. His son, Art Clokey developed clay animation made famous with characters like Gumby and Davie and Goliath. San Jose Chapter's own late Anita Graves composed "Meditation for Organ on 'Love Unknown'", which used an unusual rank on the Vissher organ, Petits Cloches (Little Bells), for part of the registration. The closing number was "Allamanda" from Arcangelo Corelli's Concerto Grosso No. 10.

The concert was followed by a Reception where a small number of Cramer's photographs were exhibited. He is a master of the art of knowing how to display his subject and process the film to enhance its beauty.
