My Journey to John Steinbeck Through the Organ of St. Paul's By William Ray

Church organs are community property in a way unlike any other instrument, and church organists connect in often intimate ways with the clergy, choirs, and congregations where they play. Two years ago, I was introduced to the life and work of John Steinbeck—an author I had never read, despite having a PhD in English—at St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Steinbeck's childhood parish in Salinas. I live in Santa Clara, but St. Paul's needed an interim quickly, and I agreed to make the 130 – mile round trip on Sundays and weekdays through Easter. I ended up staying for two years. One reason was the American Classic Aeolian-Skinner, designed by G. Donald Harrison, immaculately maintained, and miraculously unmodified since its installation in 1955.

The second reason was John Steinbeck, whose image in Easter Sunday procession with the junior choir of old St. Paul's in 1914, hangs in the new suburban church with the fabulous organ.

Curious about the connection, I read East of Eden, Steinbeck's autobiographical novel set in the Salinas of his boyhood. There I found the church, virtually a character in the book, but a flawed one. What happened at St. Paul's during Steinbeck's childhood that attracted and disturbed the author of East of Eden and The Grapes of Wrath and stayed on his mind years after he left Salinas? Eventually I read everything that he published and all of the biographies. But first I talked with parishioners whose parents knew the Steinbecks, scoured the 1973 parish history written by the professor at a local college who sang, as Steinbeck had done, in the choir, then branched out to interview other townsfolk and listen to taped interviews with old timers, long gone, who knew Steinbeck and his sisters growing up in the junior choir at St. Paul's. As a result of what I discovered from these sources, I engaged in pursuits off the organ bench I imagine few organists undertake on the job:

1. I wrote a series of articles for the journal *Steinbeck Review* tracing John Steinbeck's submerged religious

roots and their jagged outcrops in his writing, notably his last novel, *The Winter of Our Discontent*.

- 2. I led a 2013 Lenten discussion series about spiritual passages in Steinbeck's books on six successive Sunday evenings in the parish hall, attended by readers from all over town.
- 3. I commissioned *Steinbeck Suite for Organ*, a fivemovement work by **Franklin D. Ashdown** based on Steinbeck's humanity and describing specific passages in *Tortilla Flat*, Steinbeck's first successful book, and *The Grapes of Wrath*. The timing was fortuitous but sad. My younger brother died in 2013; the work is his memorial. This year is the 75th anniversary of *The Grapes of Wrath*, which is attracting national attention. **James Welch** premiered Frank's stunning work—which will be published by Zimbel Press—at Mission Santa Clara in February.
- 4. I created a website called **SteinbeckNow.com** to provide the international community of non-academic Steinbeck lovers with a forum for new ideas, reviews of recent books, and original creative work including short stories about Steinbeck, poetry and art inspired by his fiction, and music such as Frank's based on Steinbeck's life and work.
- 5. I left Salinas at the end of December with deeper regret than I can easily express. I had stayed in a temporary job two years longer than planned, playing an instrument any organist would love, but the physical distance made it impractical as a permanent post. Yet St. Paul's remains in my heart through lasting connection I developed with John Steinbeck.

Without St. Paul's, I never would have read him. I'd call that a job benefit of being an organist.

Purvis, Organist of Grace.

Last year I published my first book, *Richard Purvis*, *Organist of Grace*, a biography of California's legendary organist and composer. It was an exciting four-year project for me, and it was especially gratifying to write about one of our own Bay Area organists. I know some members of the San Jose Chapter still remember him well. I had no idea what level of interest there would be in this book, but I was overwhelmed with orders, inquiries, and additional information from all over the country and even internationally.

It was also a great experience for me to see how the book-publishing industry works these days. It used to be that if you wanted to publish a book, you had to find a publisher, and then you had to order a large number of books (1000 or more) to get a good price per copy. You never knew how many you'd actually sell, so there was always a risk factor. Many people ended up with boxes of unsold books in their garage. Furthermore, once you had the copies, you were stuck with any errors in the book (and no matter how hard you proof a book, you can't catch them all!). With the print-on-demand companies, however, there is no upfront cost to the printer. You only order books as you need them (and they are mailed directly to the customer, so you never have to package them and go to the post office). If you find an error, you simply change it in your file, upload a new version to the company and all subsequent books are printed with the corrections. Depending on the size of the book, number of pages, type of paper and colors, you can print even a large book for a very modest cost. If you've ever thought about writing a book, now is the time. I'd be happy to share information about this process with anyone.

I had such a great time writing the Purvis book that I am now in the midst of writing my second book, a biography about Dale Wood, another important California organist-composer.

If you missed information about the Purvis book the first time around, here's some for you:

A pupil of Alexander McCurdy and a classmate of Leonard Bernstein at The Curtis Institute in the 1930s, Purvis began composing widely programmed music before enlisting in the Army and fighting on the European Front, where he was captured by the Nazis during the vicious Battle of the Bulge. A survivor in every sense, he wrote some of his most enduring music in foxholes and in prison camp. After the war, he returned to his native San Francisco, where he achieved a national reputation as Organist and Master of the Choristers at San Francisco's Grace Cathedral, concert artist, teacher, and composer of more than 100 colorful works for the organ.
