

### BRAVO UGO SFORZA! Valerie Sterk



Ugo Sforza returned to the Bay Area this fall and presented another outstanding organ recital for our AGO chapter community 9 October. Sunnyvale Presbyterian Church hosted the recital and reception again this year, and shared their beautiful Balcom & Vaughan pipe organ for this performance.

An appreciative audience of around 100 enjoyed the evening of inspiring organ music.

Ugo's program centered on two French masterworks and showcased several of his original compositions and arrangements. He opened the recital with an exciting performance of Franck' grand Pièce Héroique. Following that was a first performance of his most recent composition, Jeux d'eau, op. 15 (2015). Cascading, flowing lines and playful use of 4' flute stops suggested fountains, which were the inspiration for this piece. Ugo's arrangement of Clarke's familiar Trumpet Tune combined several Italian Baroque figurations and styles into a delightful fresh interpretation featuring that well-known tune. poured his expressive soul into the pleading lament of Giazzotto's Adagio in G Minor (commonly attributed to Albinoni), during which he created hauntingly beautiful sonorities with the softer stops on the organ. Closing the program was Widor's monumental sixth organ symphony; Ugo's consummate performance of that masterpiece brought the audience to their feet in a standing ovation.

For his first encore, Ugo surprised the audience by moving to the piano and performing his exquisite, Romantic *Notturno*, op. 5, for solo piano. He then delighted and amazed everyone with a second encore, an extended improvisation on the hymn "Holy, Holy," Ugo wasn't given the hymn-tune beforehand, so his improvisation was truly impromptu. He asked that the audience sing the first two verses of the hymn with him first, and then he launched into several minutes of free fantasy and variations based on that tune. Nearly every stop on the organ had its turn within the improvisation – even the jingling Glockenstern!

A unique highlight of this organ recital was the privilege of honoring and acknowledging John Moir, the tonal designer and primary builder of the 3-manual, 57-rank Balcom and Vaughan pipe organ (1986) at Sunnyvale Presbyterian Church. He is now the president of Balcom and Vaughan (Everett, WA), and has faithfully maintained and upgraded the instrument over the years. Ugo is quite fond of this particular pipe organ, and throughout his recital showcased its various stops and tonal colors, as well as the full organ. Our chapter is grateful to the many AGO members who helped with Ugo's recital and reception – from distributing programs and welcoming audience members, to bringing food, setting up, serving, and cleaning up the reception – your participation in the evening is sincerely appreciated.

### **Recital Survey Results**

For Ugo Sforza's recital we asked each who attended to fill out a survey form. We asked them to indicate how many AGO recital they have attended, did they like the music, how did they find out about the recital, etc. We plan to do this for our upcoming events to get an idea how we can improve and encourage more people to attend.

About 100 people came to hear the Ugo Sforza's recital and 48 of them completed the recital evaluation form. On the evaluation form we ask whether this is the first time they have been to an AGO recital and if not, how many recitals they have attended in the past. On this occasion, 11 (24%) respondents indicated this was their first AGO recital. Those who have attended 1 to 3 AGO recitals in the past was 17 (37%) and 12 (26%) have attended 10 or greater in the past (evidently our AGO members). We also ask them to tell us how they learned about the recital. Most of the responses learned about the recital from a church member or the

church's bulletin. The next highest category was email or a friend. Eight respondents attended because they received an Email and seven from a friend. Nine respondents wished to be placed on an e-mail notification list. Only 3 responses came from "from a previous program" indicating that we need to make sure that we include upcoming concert announcements on each program. A total of 90% of the people surveyed rated the recital overall as either "superb" or "excellent."

We also asked each respondent for comments. Here are three of them:

"This was my first organ recital. I absolutely enjoyed every minute!"

"Marvelous performance! BRAVO!"

"What a treat – the piano piece after the program !!!! And then the hymn! I don't think I'll ever sing Holy, Holy, Holy without thinking of the presentation. What a marvelous talent!!!"

Jin Kyung Lim, an organist, harpsichordist and pianist, was born in Seoul, Korea. She earned her Bachelor in Music at Yonsei University in Korea and her Doctor of Musical Art in performance and literature at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign (UIUC). At UIUC, she studied the

harpsichord with Charlotte Mattax Moersch, the organ with Dana Robinson, the choral conducting with Joe Grant. She gave numerous solo recitals and concerts in Korea, the United States and multiple other countries. She played the organ during the Watu Gregorian Festival in Belgium and a concert in Paris as a member of Seoul Women Gregorian Chant Choir, for Marie-Claire Alain's master class in Montreal, for the Friday Noon Organ Recital Series at Church of Christ Cathedral, Indianapolis, and recently for the Spain-Portugal tour of Main Street Singers, Los Altos. As an active chamber musician, she enjoyed performing with various ensemble groups, including UI Symphony, UI Chamber Singers, UI Wind Orchestra, Champaign-Urbana Symphony Orchestra, Baroque Artists of Champaign-Urbana and Main Street Singers. She has also been serving as a church organist since the age of 14. She is currently the organist of First Lutheran Church, Palo Alto. J

## AN ORGAN COMPOSER'S LAMENT Lothar Bandermann

Some of my colleagues may not know it, but I am close to having written 450 pieces for the organ – compositions, transcriptions and arrangements. Now it is terribly difficult these days to get anything published (the profit margin is small, null or negative since an organist buys one copy – in contrast with a church choir director who buys between 20 and 50). So don't inquire how many pieces I got published! (No – not zero!) I therefore give away most of my stuff. The royalties one gets from publications are very small anyhow (typically 5% of the price of a copy), so there is no money in it anyway – typical for all serious music, to be sure.

It is particularly frustrating to write a piece for someone using his/her name (and using Duruflé's scheme for assigning pitches to letters as in his fabulous "Prelude and Fugue on the Name *Alain*," my favorite of great organ works – brings me to tears every time I hear it). I have many of those but never heard anyone performing (or just playing) theirs. Bach, Handel and Reger turn out to be "lost causes," too. Surely they are able to play my simple stuff – which may not be true for some of my contemporaries. But they do not even answer my email! Does anyone have a suggestion on how to reach them?

## CHAPTER COMPENSATION SURVEY-FEES FOR ADDITIONAL SERVICES

This is the second in a series of articles on the results of a survey conducted by the San Jose Chapter of the American Guild of Organists. The survey was tabulated in the summer of 2015 and asked about the title of the position held, how often the member was compensated, the status of employment, number of hours spent weekly, average attendance at services played, the amount of compensation and benefits, and fees for various services and additional duties.

This article reports fees for various services and additional duties.

Additional compensation consisted of fees for weddings, funerals or memorial services, rehearsals, and special services. The average fees paid for these services were:

Weddings \$189.58 Funerals/memorials \$166.07 Rehearsals \$97.86 Special services \$135.00

Future articles will deal with titles of positions, frequency of compensation, status of employment, benefits, time spent per week, and average attendance at services.
