

Previous Chapter Event Area Organists Attend Dr. John Schwandt Improvisation Workshop, 23 September

Organists from San Jose, Monterey and Palo Alto attended a workshop on organ improvisation conducted by Dr. John Schwandt, new faculty member at Oklahoma University. Dr. Schwandt was in the area as a guest of the San Jose Chapter of the American Guild of Organists and Campbell United Methodist Church, where he played a concert the following day. He opened the session with an example of improvisation on *Lobe den Herren*.

Dr. Schwandt discussed the organ program at OU and characterized the difference between American and European organ education programs. In colleges, universities and conservatories in this country organ education emphasizes interpretation. In Europe, interpretation is only one discipline of study; the other two being composition and improvisation.

Most American organists are trained in schools that had rigorous programs for organ literature, repertoire, and performance. Dr. Schwandt cited the example of famous French organists in the tradition of Vierne, Franck, Saint-Saens, and others who were as well known for their skills of improvisation as they were for performing and composing.

Improvisation skills, Dr. Schwandt pointed out, are grounded in transposition and harmony and are shaped by organists' best tools---their ears. He urged the eighteen attendees to know the tunes of things they play, especially hymns, backwards and forwards, and in different keys. He illustrated how to take a hymn tune, transpose every phrase to a different key and eventually wind up back at the original key. Organists need to listen to their congregations and hear their responses to sound and space.

He added that an organist's learning to transpose at sight greatly helps congregations and assists in worship. Dr. Schwandt emphasized the theological connections between music and worship and that organists should be a part of enhancing worship experiences. He urged organists to encourage seminaries and theological schools to return to the tradition of offering courses in music as a part of degree plans for ministers.

Harmony and music theory are other skills to be honed for organists, especially in light of modern hymnody in use in many worship services today. Dr. Schwandt showed how the pipe organ, as central musical instrument for a congregation, can be used as a part of an ensemble of other instruments, which requires that organists be familiar with harmony and lead sheets used by other church musicians.

Dr. Schwandt responded to questions from the audience that ranged from how to work with other music staff to who his favorite composer is. The two-hour session moved quickly. By the way, Dr. Schwandt said that because there was so much music to hear and so many composers to learn from, that he has probably not yet picked a favorite.

Previous Chapter Event Dr. John Schwandt Concert, 24 Sept.

AGO members, parishioners and organ music lovers got a special treat this afternoon (9/24) hearing a virtuoso organist and master improviser, **Dr. John Schwandt**, in concert at 1st United Methodist Church in Campbell.

In a program stretching from the 17th to the 20th century, Dr. Schwandt, besides demonstrating a dazzling technique, showcased the organ with its many wonderful stops. This was immediately evident in the opening piece by Buxtehude, which, because of its many sections - often set apart by grand pauses – gives opportunity to vary the color or timbre (as well as dynamics) of the organ sound. I think I had not heard some of these before, and it was a treat for me. In his improvisation at the end of the program, such capabilities of artist and organ came to full bloom. At times I even wondered if he had made use of the MIDI capability of the organ (I do believe it has it) because some of the sounds were so exotic.

Besides masterly renditions of the other pieces in the program, I was swept away by Duruflé's 'Prelude and Fugue on the Name Alain', perhaps one of the most inspiring pieces that lifts up your spirit and can bring one close to tears. This was no exception, and I was especially impressed by Schwandt's subtlety and elegance of playing.

Dr. Schwandt's improvisation was in that three known melodies or themes had been submitted to him. I wondered how that had come about, because, typically, an improviser is given new and shorter themes (created by the givers), which lend themselves better to generate structure and form in the improvisation, say a sonata. But I suspect that most of us are often challenged by improvising on a hymn when we find that the verses sung did not cover the required time interval (offertory or communion went on longer than estimated), and that therefore we rarely improvise on an original theme. In any case, I wondered if the themes given to Dr. Schwandt would create special challenges (in terms of structure) in that regard, and he confirmed that to me later. I enjoyed his imaginative registrations resulting in a sound palette of many colors, again his marvelous technique, and the richness of his ideas which requires - as he told me - the

familiarity with, and reproduction at will, of the many different ideas and techniques in the organ literature. I was particularly impressed by his use of harmonic sequences which were sometimes long enough that I feared a misstep would happen along the way – but never did! Special highpoints for me were the appearance of the first theme "When in our music God is glorified" in the pedal and the fugal section later on.

ANNOUNCEMENT

November 19th, 2006 –On this day, Sunday, at 7:30 p.m., the Peninsula Chapter of the A.G.O. and St. Mark's Episcopal Church, Palo Alto will be hosting a most unusual program, featuring the late, unpublished works of one of the 20th century's most prolific choral and organ composers, **David N. Johnson**.

Most organists are familiar with at least some of David's work, especially the numerous trumpet tunes, the hymn "Earth and all Stars", and popular anthems such as "Saw Ye my Savior." Most of these works were originally published in the 60's and 70's, but Dr. Johnson continued composing, right up until his untimely death in 1987. This material exists in pencil sketches, in various states of legibility, and has been compiled by his daughter **Teal**, assisted by her husband, **David Hatt**, who is a former Dean of the San Jose Chapter and Assistant Organist of St. Mary's Cathedral in San Francisco. Together, they have compiled a large number of these works, most of which are rather brief, and which reflect Dr. Johnson's evolving artistic concerns during the 1980's. Many of these pieces do not sound like the "typical DNJ work."

The program will feature **Mr. Hatt** on organ, baritone **Stuart Duke** and trumpeter **Carole Klein**. Together, they will present a program of approximately 75 minutes' worth of organ solo works, works for trumpet and organ/piano, and works for solo voice/trumpet with organ. The audience will have a chance to join in at the end on the congregational hymn, "There is enough to feed this world." So tell your friends and come out for an interesting evening.
