SEPTEMBER CHAPTER EVENT Dr. David Cherwien 22 Sept 2007 Workshop 23 Sept 2007 Hymn Festival / Concert

"What a treat to have **Dr. David Cherwien** come to **Campbell United Methodist Church** for a workshop and
Hymn Festival. Over 30
people came out on a wet
Saturday morning to spend
time learning the history of **Paul Manz's** legacy of superb



sacred music. Dr. Cherwien's stories told of following Dr. Manz to take the post at Mt. Olive Lutheran Church in Minneapolis, MN. He share stories of how Dr Manz began improvising on the hymns for worship services; was greatly encouraged by the members of the congregation; studied in Europe; returned to the states and continued a lengthy career as a brilliant church musician. Interspersed with the tales Dr. Cherwien performed examples of the musical style that has become known as the Manz sound.

Some of the tidbits we heard:

How Dr. Cherwien's background as a rock band member has influenced his improvising. How the first hymn festival he attended at Mt. Olive was the defining moment in his decision to become an organist, never dreaming that years later he would follow in Dr. Manz's footsteps. How one participant of such a festival was overheard asking "Who's looking at a watch?"

Dr. Cherwein spent quite a lot of time discussing how to make hymn singing an integral part of the service and providing a musical expansion on the sermon. He gave many tips on how to vary the registration for each verse of a hymn, based directly on the text.

He also gave away some of the secrets that Paul Manz used for his unusually varied and delightful registrations.

All this was but foreshadowing of the Festival on Sunday afternoon. The combined choirs from several area churches met to rehearse, then help lead a hymn sing. With Dr. Cherwien directing from the console, we sang favorite hymns and listened to the masterful improvisations and compositions. Reflections written by Dr. Cherwien's wife, Susan, were read between each of the hymns. The experience was very powerful and inspiring. Such a great way to spend a weekend as we start into our fall music season! Thank you **Andrew Birling** and **Mary Ann Gee** for bringing Dr. David Cherwien to our area.

HYMN PLAYING

Continuing comments on Hymn Playing Dick Ferris (organist at St. Paul's Church in Salinas) from 1982 articles.

Each Tuesday morning, just as I push the button on the tape machine, something stirs in me much as it did when I was a child poised to open a Christmas gift. That's because each Tuesday I begin my review of the Sunday service – the one I have helped to lead the previous Sunday.

My anticipation is not for the prelude or any of the incidental music, but it is for the initial response to the introduction of the first hymn. Is it enthusiastic, joyous – is it felt and passed from person to person? Indeed, are all the responses shared and appropriate?

Next, is the ministry that is shared by choir and organist clear? Does it accomplish what is intended and is this shared by all?

Then comes the consideration of whether the instrument balances the congregation and speaks clearly to them. And then, somewhere at the last comes the listening to the Prelude, Postlude, and Communion hymns.

I would add as an aside that unless many of the above receive more than lip service, you'll make as much of a contribution to your parish as throwing a sack of water into the Grand Canyon, whether your instrument is electronic, pipe or pump &

Pipes in the Desert - Region IX Mid-Winter Conclave

The AGO Region IX Mid-Winter Conclave will be held in Tucson, Arizona, January 20–24, 2008.

Rich in Spanish heritage, Tucson is surrounded by the diversity of the Sonoran Desert—mountains studded with saguaro cacti, desert washes, balmy winter temperatures, and beautiful sunsets. We think that the diversity of the desert will be reflected nicely in the conclave program. Millennia Too!, for example, will be playing the world premiere of **Stephen Sturk's** *California Mission Suite*. Organist **Richard Elliott** will be playing **Pamela Decker's** *Tango for Tucson*. The closing worship service will open with a work by Tucsonan **Jay Vosk**, for native flute and organ, and will then focus on **Joel Martinson's** Missa Guadalupe, with the **Tucson Arizona Boys Chorus** serving as the choir for the service.

The conclave is presenting two optional side trips that showcase the desert southwest. One trip is to Mission San Xavier del Bac, known as the "White Dove of the Desert," one of the most photographed churches in the country. Another side trip is to the Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum. Most of the exhibits at the museum are outside and show the animals, plants, and geology of the Sonoran Desert. This is a museum like no other. It combines elements of zoos along with displays of local geology and desert plants.

TRANSPOSING TIPS

The Art of Transposing: There have been a number of letters that have been sent to via the AGO Yahoo group concerning ways of transposing. Here is a collection of these suggestions.

Question – I would appreciate any tips or hints you can give me for transposing easily. Do you try to do it only by reading intervals, or by playing by ear, or a combination of both plus other techniques? Any suggestions would be appreciated.

From Mark Bruce - I don't pretend to be an expert, but the best approach I know is to think in terms of clefs. You already know the F and G (bass and treble) clefs and if you get familiar with the c clef you have it made. The next step is to move the clefs around. For instance: to transpose up a third, move the clef down a third (that essentially makes the treble clef identical to the bass clef: bottom line is a 'g', top line is an 'a', but up a couple octaves). This sounds tricky, but think of the way you teach your students the bass and treble clefs and apply it to yourself. While you want to be aware of intervals, of course, in the heat of the moment what you need to know is that the third line is 'g' or 'f' or 'd' or whatever. A little practice with moving clefs around will give you confidence in that, just as you already are at home with bass and treble clefs.

The hard part is the accidentals, of course. In 'sharp' keys natural signs are more likely to mean lowered notes, in this order (memorize): ti, mi, la, re, so, do, fa, or 7, 3, 6, 2, 5, 1, 4), in 'flat' keys naturals are usually raising notes (4, 1, 5, 2, 6, 3, 7). Best to practice transposing hymns before Stravinsky, for your own comfort and that of those you love.

Thanks for bringing this up. It is a neglected skill in this country especially, and I remember from the distant past how much one can profit from it. One piano teacher I had (French) had me play everything I worked on in keys other than the original before she let me play in the written key. "Get to know the piece before you establish the muscle memories that are so hard to change later on." And playing a passage in different keys gives you great insights into what is actually happening in the music, rather than settling for which keys to push. I wish I had continued this noble practice technique more faithfully. You've inspired me to get back to it.

I hope this was useful. In the end, the main thing is just to do it and do it and do it.

From John Jarvis – I was fortunate that my piano teacher when I was young taught music theory as much as he taught technique. He had me work on a hymn for every lesson with a technique that in later years my Theory teachers in college also encouraged. Take a short hymn that you know fairly well and play it in every key of the scale during your practice time. Start with a simple hymn that does not drift from the tonic key and has a simple chord structure. I try to stay in the easier keys until I really get the hang of the hymn - no Key of Cb to start! Then Practice, Practice! I still do this a lot as my congregation really likes it when I change the key on the last verse of a big hymn. Also, many of the older hymnals had the keys set too high for men to sing comfortably on Sunday morning. Thankfully, many of the new hymnals have the keys set lower. College theory teachers will encourage the use of J.S. Bach "Choral-Gesange", the 389 Chorales for four-part mixed chorus. However, I find most of these too difficult to start with.

The transitions from one key to the next are often difficult for me and I have to really study the pivot chords before attempting changes. I can get lost during a church service as my mind wanders, so I write out almost all of my modulations so that I can remember what I had worked out earlier.

From Barry Ford – I was taught this technique by Peter Hurford and it works well for me,

The best way is to translate all the music into chord positions: root position, II, III, sub-dominant, dominant, etc. Then it does not matter what key you are in, you merely think in terms on the chord position in the key you want.

Inversions and complex chords (like dominant 11th, 13th, etc. are harder to transpose but even if you leave out some notes, the chord base will be correct. Try simple hymns first then you can progress into more complex hymns later.

From Carol Griffin – The answers that have been given so far are all good. When I started as a teen-ager, I used the combination of the Roman Numerals and the ear. You need to make notes on the page of the number of each chord change, then think of the letter name of that chord in the new key. Try to pick hymns that use only the primary chords of I IV V at first. You are already acquainted with those chords. Then the next one you would probably use would be the II, either major or minor, and that would be followed by the V, and you know where that takes you!

Intervals are definitely a help. Does the melody move by steps, skips or repeated notes? The inner voices make up the chord so that will carry you along.

I used to play in the original key, then up a second, down a second, up a third, down a third. There are some songs you can actually do in every key, for instance, Amazing Grace, Precious Lord Take my Hand, Kum ba Ya, What a Friend etc.

When I started teaching the Robert Pace Piano Method, I got much better at transposing because I played thru the books in every key so I would have a good background for teaching it. Starting with level one! Good recommendation!
