CA Premiere of the "The Book of Waters"

The Chancel Choir of Campbell United Methodist Church, Andrew Birling, director, and the Sanctuary Choir of Prince of Peace Lutheran, Saratoga, **Barbara Day Turner**, director, are hard at work preparing for the California premiere on **Sunday, April 13th at 4:00 p.m.** of the cantata **The Book of Waters** at Campbell United Methodist Church. The cantata is a collaborative work between librettist **Richard Leach** of Lackawaxen, PA and **Curt Oliver** of Brooklyn Park, MN. Also featured in the performance will be soloists from both churches, a dance ensemble choreographed by **Jamie Parnum**, and the Carillon Choir handbell choir of Campbell United Methodist, directed by **Jim Groff**.

Leach writes, "Several overlapping themes form the basis for the text of The Book of Waters. They include water in the biblical story of God with his people, water in the natural world and as a societal concern, and the water of Christian baptism. It uses some familiar Bible stories—the creation, Noah's flood, the exodus from Egypt—and several passages less well known but powerfully relevant. It also touches on the need for human stewardship of the world's waters."

Oliver writes, "The music for The Book of Waters was written in the spring and summer of2003, and borrows a number of themes from the rich world of classical music, including The Moldau by Bedrich Smetana, an Air from Handel's Water Music, the folk song The Water is Wide, and the grand old American hymn Shall We Gather at the River."

It is a tuneful and joyous work. With the addition of dancers, handbells and percussion, it promises to be a wonderful event for all ages. There is no charge for the event, but a free-will offering will be received to benefit a world water cause. A reception will follow the concert. **Campbell United Methodist Church is located at 1675 Winchester Blvd**, near Hamilton Ave in Campbell. Dr. Thomas Troeger AGO IX winter conclave at Tucson, Arizona Joyce Rhodes

Monday, January 21, 2008, found attendees to the Mid-Winder Conclave in a beautiful Tucson setting at St. Philip's in the Hills Episcopal Church, experiencing morning worship and the Keynote Address by Dr. Thomas Troeger, theologian, Yale Divinity School. It is impossible to fully describe the uplifting feeling I got while worshiping and listening. Just suffice it to say. "you should have been there". Every aspect of the service was well planned and flowed from one part to another. Organ music, hymn and choral singing, homily, scripture readings, and prayers all had an important part in the total service.

Dr. Troeger, offered the homily and following the service, gave the Keynote Address. He is a gifted and motivational speaker. His use of words is truly amazing and following are just a few of his thoughts: "...I remember as a child how I felt when I put on my father's clothing ... so important, so grown up, so right, like singing psalms, and singing songs. Just think how you would feel if you put on the clothing of Christ, how they would fit and how the music would fit". "If you're alive, you're an orchestra. You are the heartbeat...and your heart beats 40 million times a year...." "Music and theology are inter-related." "A new beatitude - Blessed are they who tear carpets out of churches." "If there could be music this beautiful, there must be a God, spoken by a man who lost faith, but kept going to church to hear the organ music. You never know how your music will be heard and the meaning it will convey." "Laments nurture us. Think how you feel when you hear "O Come, Emmanuel". "Listening to music is performing and performing is listening." "Count your pulse, listen to the wind, the silence, everything is musical."

He has written many books and hymns, which I recommend to you. Go to Oxford Press for a list, and/or for permission to use the words to his many hymns. The words to the closing hymn were his, tune, Aberystwyth, verses 1 and 4 following. Dr. Frederick Swann, organist, improvised the postlude on this tune.

"Learn from all the songs of earth that we never sing alone, that our music has its birth in what wind and wave intone, that before God spoke a word, God first blew upon the sea, and the breath of music stirred ev'rything that came to be."

"When we harmonize with earth and its elemental song, we recall who gave us birth and to whom we all belong, we more deeply understand what the living Christ displays: we are fashioned by God's hand for a life that sings God's praise."

Bach Performance Practice given by Jeffrey Campbell AGO IX winter conclave at Tucson, Arizona Pat Milstead

Bach never had a 1st rate instrument himself. Only he & and few of his exceptional students could play his works.

Play low pedal notes on manual for a balanced sound.

Cantus Firmus: use reed or flute. **Tremulant** in CF is OK. Baroque organs had tremulants. He even suggested a celeste with a 4' flute.

LH slurs can indicate articulation. Bass lines: detache on repeated notes, legato on adjacent notes. Continuo Bass line-play lightly and 'lifting'. Try only toes on pedal detached.

Few manual changes. Trio Sonatas, no change in registration-try only 8'or4'. Add mutation for more color.

Duple time: beat 1 longer, beat 2 shorter.

Imitate wind instruments.

Notes that leap-play detached. Tied notes over a bar – make it 'rest'. 4 notes, think a group.

Fugues: 1st presentation-longer sound: 2nd think in 4 note phrases.

Registrations: there are few suggestions

Von Himmel: bright joyous plenum OR 4' with 8' pedal-completely different feeling.

He liked color: he tried new and unusual sound qualities

For variations use as much color as possible

Tremulant in cantus firmus OK

In Dulci Jubilo

Canon between manual and pedal-distinct sounds

Another canon between the two middle voices.

There are NO DOGMATIC RULES. BEAUTY TO THE EAR IS WHAT'S MOST IMPORTANT.

French music: use double dotting in dry rooms.



Prize: \$500

The winning piece will be premiered by Dr. Gail Archer (Manhattan School of Music) at the SJAGO/CUMC joint event on September 21, 2008.

- Composers of any age are eligible.
- Entry is limited to one unpublished composition per composer.
- Performance time shall be 3 ¹/₂ to 5 minutes and must be printed under the title of the piece.
- The piece shall be based on an American hymn-tune. If it is a tune held under copyright, the composer will be responsible for obtaining permission to use any copyrighted material.
- The piece should be of medium difficulty, accessible to most organists with moderate practice.
- The submitted manuscript must be of professional quality and legibility.
- DO NOT PUT YOUR NAME OR ANY DEDICATIONS ON THE MANUSCRIPT ITSELF. The composition will be coded for identification by the composition committees of CUMC and SJAGO.
- Four (4) copies of the work must be submitted with the completed and signed entry form.
- Compositions and entry forms must be postmarked by June 15, 2008.
- If, in the opinion of the jury, no composition merits an award of this stature, no prize will be made. Anonymity of the entrants will be maintained throughout the competition.
- Any winner will be notified and the award made by September 1, 2008.

My little pipe organ has 2 ranks (8' stopped and 2' open), with a split 2' stop (i.e. it can be put on the manual either below or above middle-C, or both or not at all). Full pull-down pedal. We bought it in the mid-70s in Honolulu (where we lived at the time) from an Episcopal nun who had built it. The pipes (recently restored by **Roger Inkpen**) are from at least 5 different ranks - probably came from Schoenstein who then had an office in Honolulu.
