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## Dean's Message

 $\mathcal{D}$  ear Friends,

I am sure that by now most of us are aware that the church music world has lost one of its greatest influences for more than half of the twentieth century with the death of Paul Manz on October 28. Paul Manz's tireless enthusiasm for church music and zealous interpretations of hymnody has become almost legendary, and those of us who are still "in the trenches" week to week owe much to his pioneering spirit. The revival of church music that began in the second half of the twentieth century was greatly influenced by his determination to educate congregations about hymnody and train organists regarding interpretation of texts via the console.

*I* myself had the great pleasure of hearing his annual Palm Sunday hymn festival at House of Prayer Lutheran Church in Minneapolis shortly after I moved there in 1999. I think what surprised me most was seeing this short, slightly stocky man walking slowly out toward the console. Was this really the man who wrote the wonderful, exuberant settings of "God of Grace and God of Glory" and "Now Thank We All Our God?"

 $\boldsymbol{\mathcal{T}}$  hen he began the Prelude.

At first I wasn't sure what he was playing—it had an air of familiarity to it, yet I couldn't quite place my finger on it. Gradually the registration began to build. Suddenly I heard the familiar lines of "E'en So, Lord Jesus, Quickly Come." The music continued to build, rising to its fullest at "Rejoice in heav'n, all ye that dwell therein, rejoice on earth ye saint below. For Christ is coming soon." I knew then that this was the Paul Manz I had come to know through his many settings of hymn tunes and anthems.

Then just as quickly as it built, it faded away, and launched into the Opening Hymn for the festival. The excitement in the room was palpable and contagious. The room was full. Full of people of ALL ages. Gathered during an incredibly busy time of the church year. Ready to sing. And be inspired to sing. And to offer their inspiration to the leader of song. A beautiful, mutually beneficial relationship was formed, at least for that hour and a half.

 $\mathcal{H}$ ow often do we forget that our job is to inspire the song of the congregation? How often do we get so bogged down in the details of the service that we forget what our primary task as organists is? When was the last time our congregations inspired us to continue to offer our very best in worship?

**O**he of the perks of living in Minneapolis was that the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians had an ad hoc group of folks who gathered for lunch once a month around the area. I attended as often as I could, and greatly enjoyed the camaraderie of fellow Lutheran musicians, as well as sharing ideas, tips and anecdotes about our various positions. Though he was well into his 80's at that point, Paul Manz would grace us with his presence as often as he could grace us with his presence as grace

us with his presence as often as he could. His presence was very warmly received each time, and the amazing thing to me was to see him engaged and interested in each person's work, and how things were going, whether they were in a large church or small. Then I remembered a quote of his, and witnessed it even at lunch. He said "you must love the people you are called to serve."

 $\mathcal{H}$ ow often do we forget that, especially in these rehearsals in November and December, when the choir is trying to learn the 27<sup>th</sup> anthem for the Christmas Eve service? Or when someone in the congregation asks why we can't sing Christmas Carols during the season of Advent?

 $\mathcal{M}$ y wish for all of you during the next few weeks is that you continue to be the best inspiration for congregational song that you are able to be. And that the congregation you serve will inspire you as well. And that you continue to love the people you are called to serve, especially as we prepare and celebrate the season of Christmas.

Looking forward to hearing all about your services and the excellent music you offered at our "Twelfth Night" Party on January 3!



### PAUL OTTO MANZ



Beloved composer, organist, and church musician **Dr. Paul Manz** passed away in St. Paul Minnesota on October 29at age 90. He died surrounded by his family while they sang his famous motet "E'en So, Lord Jesus, Quickly Come." Funeral services were held in St. Paul on November 8. Paul's many compositions,

recordings, and hymn festivals have influenced the art and practice of church music in the United States since the 1960's. . With a lengthy list of performances at venues like The Kennedy Center in Washington D.C., with the National Symphony; Symphony Center in Chicago, with the Chicago Symphony; and Orchestra Hall in Minneapolis, with the Minnesota Orchestra, Manz was able to perform the canon of major works for organ and orchestra – a feat that few organists can claim. His playing and teaching has influenced untold numbers of organists throughout this country who considered him a mentor and friend. "Love the people you have been called to serve" was the surprising answer Manz gave when asked what one piece of advice he would offer to an individual starting out in the field of church music today. . This seemingly simple response belies a depth of experience, wisdom, and faith which was formed and molded in the crucible of service to God's people of the church over the course of a life well lived.

Thank you for the grace of singing with me across the years in good times and in bad, when our words have stuck in our throats and when our

eyes have overflowed with joy.

It has ever been a Song of Grace:

'Love to the loveless shown that we might lovely be.'

I have just been the organist.

Thank you for letting me play.
