Gail Martin and Linda Pearse Organ & Sacbut Recital

Dr. Gayle h. Martin and **Linda Pearse** will present a recital of Renaissance, Baroque, and contemporary music for organ and bass sackbut on **Friday evening**, **February 24**, at 7:30 pm at Sunnyvale Presbyterian Church. (The sackbut, a Renaissance-era brass instrument, is the predecessor of the trombone.) Their program will feature music by European masters from the Renaissance and Baroque eras — Sweelinck, Frescobaldi, Froberger, Lubeck, and Buxtehude — along with more recent music by Canadian composers (Healey Willan, Gerald Bales, and Denis Bédard).

Gayle is music professor, organist, and choral director at Mount Allison University in Sackville, New Brunswick (Canada). She holds graduate degrees from McGill University and University of Alberta, and studied organ under Jean Langlais and Susan Landale. Gayle is currently working on her fourth solo organ CD, and has accompanied, recorded, and toured internationally with various choral and early-music ensembles.

Linda is a specialist in the musical repertoire of early seventeenth-century Italy. She holds faculty positions at Mount Allison University and at the Historic Performance Institute, Jacobs School of Music, Indiana University in Bloomington. She tours extensively and internationally, performing on sackbut and trombone. Linda is the Artistic Director of the San Francisco Early Music Summer Baroque Workshop, the Sackville Festival of Early Music, and of the early-music ensemble, ¡Sacabuche!.

An Email Interview with Gayle h. Martin

NL: What first started your interest in the pipe organ?

Martin: I was thirteen, had taken piano lessons for 8 years and was quite competent so I auditioned for an organ position. They asked me to sight read a hymn and my young confident (cockie) self played it flawlessly but then they said they would like it with pedals. Of course I could not play three chords so I was determined to conquer that inadequacy in my musical being. I started lessons immediately and fell in love with the organ and its new challenges.

NL: Who are some of the most influential teachers with whom you studied?

Martin: My first teacher when I was in high school was so encouraging; I wanted to go to every lesson more than well prepared. I was lucky to study in college with Harriette Richardson and William Maul. Then I was extremely fortunate to study with Jean Langlais in Paris as well as Susan Landale at the Conservatoire de Rueil-Malmaison; both of these reknowned teachers were fabulous and highly inspirational—I was practicing 6 hours every day. After three years in Paris I got lucky again and studied with John Grew, a French Classical master and a beautiful human being, at McGill University in Montreal

NL: What are some of the more interesting venues in which you have played?

Martin: When in Paris, age 22, Jean Langlais had me play for an entire service at Ste. Clotilde (where Francks picture is beside the organ with his long fingers). I was most struck by how the sound lingered in the darkish air like the smoke from the incense. My Vermont family was in attendance. Also, I played for my 'premier prix' on the grand organ at St. Germain-en-Laye which was exciting and challenging due t the heavy action.

NL: Do you compose music? If you do, can you describe your compositional process?

Martin: I have arranged music but not composed music. A bagpiper from Rawlins Cross Celtic band wanted to collaborate so I arranged several Celtic folk tunes for organ, bagpipe and tin whistle. The CD, 'Air Races', that we produced as a result of this collaboration was successful, intriguing and enjoyable since it was outside the box of classical music making. Ian chose the tunes he wished for us to perform and I would arrange them in a 'classical' manner which included elements such as points of imitation and traditional forms

NL: Who are some of your favorite modern composers?

Martin: Despite my focus on early Baroque music in the last decade or so, I thrive on the challenge of working with the wonderful music of Petr Eben. His harmonic language is capturing and full of creativity, he writes with a keen attention to rhythm and variations thereof...sometimes each appendage is playing in a different rhythm AND different key. I recorded his work, 'Sonntagsmusik' on my first CD 'Prism' and I plan to record his 'Homage to Buxtehude' on my upcoming CD, Part II of 'Partners in Time'. I also enjoy the music of Americans Pamela Decker and Leo Sowerby, Canadians Kloppers and Bedard and from France Langlais and Messaien.

An Email Interview with Linda Peasre

NL: What first started your interest in the brass instruments?

Peasre: A concert by a local jazz ensemble featured a trombone soloist and I unknowingly assumed that trombones are commonly featured as soloists! I loved the sound and the movement of the slide. The sound is like a voice and seems to caress the ear in a unique and intimate way.

NL: How old were you when you first started studying seriously?

Peasre: I began with piano lessons at age 6 and moved on to trombone at age 10. I was always serious about the trombone and enjoyed my hours of practice — the piano did not fare as well. While living at my childhood home on Vancouver Island, I took a ferry boat each week to Gabriola Island to study with a former member of Toronto's Boss Brass, John Capon.

NL: When you first started studying the sacbut and why do you choose it?

Peasre: I was introduced to the sackbut while living and studying with a wonderful artist, Abbie Conant at a music conservatory in Trossingen, Germany. My teachers, Charles Toet and Bruce Dickey count among the finest early brass musicians the world offers. I was fortunate to continue my studies with them at the School Cantorum in Basel, Switzerland. I chose the sackbut because of the exquisite concerted repertoire for sackbuts and voices. I was mesmerized by the sackbut's ability to blend seamlessly with voices — a combination I still adore today.

NL: How is sacbut different from the modern trombone?

Peasre: A sackbut serves a different function than a modern trombone. Its design and resulting mellow sound, flexibility with articulations, and suppleness are perfectly suited to the delicate concerted music composed during the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries. It blends with the instruments it joins, and creates beauty and grace with its sound. A modern orchestral trombone is larger, lacquered, and with a bell that is more flared. It is well suited to its role in a large orchestra, accompanying high numbers of string instruments playing on metal-wound strings and bringing the sometimes bombastic and sometimes otherworldly sounds of the late 19th and 20th centuries to life.

NL: Who are some of the most influential teachers with whom you studied?

Peasre: I mentioned earlier that my most influential teachers of early music are Charles Toet and Bruce Dickey. I still learn from their recordings and performances today. There are a few contemporary players who also inspire, such as Adam Wolff.

NL: What are some of the more interesting venues in which you have played?

Peasre: I played at the Paris Opera House in the weeks following 9/11. The various types of marble in the building were stunning and the high-level security certainly made that performance stick out in my mind. I have always adored performing in Europe's fine houses and halls. I am equally fascinated by performances in alternative venues, such as repurposed train stations, and atriums or museums.

NL: Who are some of your favorite modern composers?

Peasre: I enjoy almost all music, but particularly composers who write in non-traditional interdisciplinary contexts (Huang Ruo comes to mind). I also enjoy the "traditional" modern composers of the 20th century like Cowell, Schoenberg, late Stravinsky, and the minimalists such as Steve Reich.

Frasier Organ Scholarship 2017

Grace Church is an Anglo-Catholic Parish with a fine liturgical tradition, which the organ is designed to support. The instrument will stand in a case at the west end of the church. Installation is scheduled for May, 2017. The choirmaster and organist is Kyle Swann, who is also Lecturer in Opera at the Yale School of Music. The Priest-in-charge is the Rev. Rowena J. Kemp. 🎜

COMPETITION FOR COMPOSERS UNDER THE AGE OF 30

NEW YORK CITY—The American Guild of Organists (AGO) is proud to announce a new music competition for composers under the age of 30. Organized and sponsored by the AGO Young Organists in the North Central Region, the competition for a new work for organ solo, 3–6 minutes, is open to any individual who is younger than 30 years of age as of August 31, 2017. U.S. composers need

not be AGO members; composers living outside of the U.S. must be AGO members.

First prize is \$1,000; second prize is \$500; three honorable mentions will also be announced. All prize winning and honorable mention compositions will be performed at the AGO North Central Regional Convention in Iowa City, Iowa, on June 20, 2017.

The submission deadline is March 10. Competition results will be announced on March 31. For complete information and application instructions, visit Agohq.org.
